Title of the Course : IED 151 (02) Introduction to Britain I

Year and Semester : 2018-2019 Fall

I. Aim of the Course

The aim of this course is to provide the student with the knowledge and skills to survey and interpret the historical, social, and political developments in Britain from the early ages to the 17th century, and to make a survey of how these changes in different periods of British history and society were reflected in the literary works of the relevant periods. Thereby, by the end of the course, the student is expected to establish links between the historical evolution of the British society and the literary works written in this period.

IV. Method of Instruction

Their preparation can be checked with pop-quizzes if necessary. Students are expected to have their course materials with them at all times.

V. Requirements

The students are expected to come to class having read, studied or watched the assigned material. Attendance is fully required and obligatory. More than 11 hours of absence will result in F1. Participation in class discussions is crucial as it will have an impact on student's mark. Plagiarism and cheating in any form will result in failure.

VI. Assessment

Class participation, assignments and quizzes: 10%

Mid-term Examinations: 40% (20% each)

Final Exam: 50%

In the grading of the exams up to 25% of the total mark will be taken off for grammatical and writing mistakes. Also, students who get less than 50/100 in the final exam will automatically fail the course no matter how high their mid-term results are. Plagiarism will result in F3.
