I. Aim of the Course

The course aims to offer a comprehensive knowledge of Renaissance and the 17th century English literature and to illustrate this knowledge through a study of works representative of the literary achievements of the age.

II. Course Outline

- Week I The Renaissance, background, the rise and development of humanism, the revival of Platonism, literary conventions (supplementary reading: F.Petrarcha, G.Boccaccio "The Return of the Muses," M.Ficino: "Soul of Man," Mirandola: "The Dignity of Man")
- Week II Renaissance in England
- Week III Sonnet tradition from Petrarch to English sonnet writers; Wyatt: "Farewell Love," "The Long Love...," Surrey: "The Soote Season," "Alas! So All things Now..."
- Week IV Sidney: Sonnets 1, 2, 5 and 71 from *Astrophil and Stella*,
- Week V Spenser: Sonnets 54 and 75 from *Amoretti* and Shakespeare: Sonnets 18, 20, 130 and 144, Queen Elizabeth I's "On Monsieur's Departure"
- Week VI Poetic theory of the age; Spenser's "October Eclogue" and extracts from Sidney's *The Defence Of Poesie*;
- Week VII Mid-Term I
- Week VIII 17th C. Literary background and introduction to poetic forms
- Week IX Cavalier Poetry and Ben Jonson; "On My First Son,," "Still to be Neat," "Song to Celia," Robert Herrick "The Argument of is Book," "Delight in Disorder," Andrew Marvell: "To His Coy Mistress"
- Week X Metaphysical Poetry and John Donne: "Song," "The Sun Rising" and from *Holy Sonnets*: 1, 10, 14.
- Week XI G.Herbert: "Altar," "Jordan (1)",
- Week XII Mid-Term II
- Week XIII John Milton and extracts from *Paradise Lost*
- Week XIV 17th C. Prose; Bacon's "Of Studies" (1625 version)

IV. Method of Instruction

It will be conducted through lecturing and discussion of the assigned texts. Class participation is essential.

V. Requirements
