SYLLABUS

Title of the course: IED 52 (02) Introduction to Britain II **Year and Term**: 2011-2012 Spring **Class Hours**: Thursday 09:00-11.45 **Classroom**: B2/203

I. Aim of the course

The course aims to familiarise students with the historical, socio-cultural and political background of Britain in the 17th, 18th, 19th and 20th centuries together with their reflections in literature of the relevant periods through analyzing main representative literary figures and sample texts.

II. Course Outline

Week I: The overview of the historical, socio-cultural and political background of Britain until the 17th century with their reflections in literature. **Week II:** The 17th century social, political and historical background: the Stuart

Week II: The 17th century social, political and historical background: the Stuart Dynasty, James I and Charles I, Civil War, Interregnum (Oliver Cromwell).

Week III: Restoration, Charles II, James II, William of Orange, Bill of Rights, Act of Settlement, Queen Anne, Act of Union.

Week IV: The 17th century literature: Metaphysical Poetry: John Donne. Cavalier Poetry: Andrew Marvell, Robert Herrick. John Milton (epic).

Week V: Ben Jonson (Comedy of Humours), Comedy of Manners. George I, Robert Walpole.

Week VI: MIDTERM EXAMINATION I

Week VII: George II, Jacobite Uprisings, George III, The American War of Independence.

Week VIII: The 18th century literature: Jonathan Swift, Alexander Pope (satire), Addison and Steele.

Week IX: The rise of the novel: Daniel Defoe's *Robinson Crusoe*, Samuel Richardson *Pamela*.

Week X: French Revolution and abolition of slavery, George IV, William IV.

Week XI: Queen Victoria, Benjamin Disraeli, the condition of women (the cult of respectability, the angel in the house and fallen woman).

Week XII: MIDTERM EXAMINATION II

Week XIII: The 19th century literature: Romantic Literature: William Blake's "The Sick Rose", "The London", "The Chimney Sweeper". Mary Wolstonecraft's "A Vindication of the Rights of Men". William Wordsworth's "I wandered Lonely as A Cloud". Victorian Literature: John Stuart Mill's "On Liberty", "The Subjection of Women". Lord Alfred Tennyson's "Ulysses". Robert Browning's "Porphyria's Lover" Pre-Raphaelite Movement: Dante Gabriel Rosetti's "My Sister's Sleep".

Week XIV: The 20th century Britain: World Wars, Margaret Thatcher, War Poetry: Rupert Brooke's "The Soldier", Siegfried Sassoon's Glory of Women", Absurd Drama, Angry Young Man Movement.

IV. Method of Instruction

VI. Assessment

There will be two midterm examinations and a final examination. In the grading of examination papers, up to 25 % of the total mark will be taken off for grammatical and writing mistakes.
