Aim of the Course is to study works of literature in the light of the cultures that shape and change them. The course is comprised of three modules. The first module will deal with epic and its rewritings first concentrating on classical epic and the concept of the epic hero and later dealing with rewritings or these in the 20th century in two different countries. The second module will deal with the treatment of the Troy story and focus on the characters, concept of heroism and the approaches to love. The third module aims to study the use of animal stories and the meanings attributed to them and how they have been employed for different aims. Course Requirements and method of instruction

Each student will prepare a formal paper(in conformity with the PMLA format) dealing with at least two of the works studied. There will also be supplementary audio-visual material related to the works studied. There will be midterm and a final examination.
