SYLLABUS

Title of the Course: IED 134 (01) Study Skills and Research Techniques

Year and Term: 2015-2016 Spring

I. Aim and Contents: The aim of this course is to help students develop effective study skills such as reading, skimming, note taking, revising, studying for exams and tips for success in exams and to teach the students the necessary steps of research and writing a paper, which include selecting a topic, using the library, compiling a working bibliography, taking notes, avoiding plagiarism, preparing an outline and writing a well-organised, adequately supported research paper.

Week 5 (March 4th): MLA (Modern Language Association) format, kinds of academic resources, citation reference format. Compiling a working bibliography. Workshop-3

Week 6 (March 11th): MLA (Modern Language Association) format. Building effective paragraphs. Workshop- 4

IV. Method of Instruction: The course will be conducted through lectures, class discussion, workshops, individual and group work.

V. Requirements: There will be a visit to the library for orientation. The students will carry out extensive research at Beytepe and other libraries like Bilkent Library, METU Library, and National Library.

Each student will determine the topic for her/his research paper and will be responsible for conducting her/his own research project. The research paper will be in MLA format and maximum 6 pages double-spaced. Writing the final draft of the project and an in-class exam will be evaluated as the final exam and marks below 50 in the final exam will be regarded as failure.

VI. Attendance: Attendance is compulsory. More than 11 (eleven) hours of absence will result in F1. Punctual attendance is required at every class meeting.

VII. Assessment: There will be one mid-term, one final paper (max. 5 pages excluding Works-Cited page/s), and one final exam. Class work, assignments and research tasks will be also marked. In the grading of the examination papers and research paper, up to 25% of the total mark will be taken off for grammatical and writing mistakes. The assessment will be made on the following basis:
