Course Description: The objective in the intensive study of eight representative plays will be to enhance student awareness of English drama from its early beginnings in the medieval period into the Restoration. During the course, each dramatic movement will be studied in detail. The thematic, technical and stylistic contribution of each playwright to English drama will be thoroughly analysed.
