Aim and Contents:

The aim of this course is to enable the student to acquire the knowledge and competence required to understand the development of the 18th C. English literature and English Romanticism in their historical, political and cultural contexts. The political and social changes that affected the poets of the periods will also be discussed through a study of works representative of the literary trends of the ages.

Coursebook: The majority of the texts will be from The Norton Anthology of English Literature, Vol I & II.

Supplementary Reading: Reading lists on related materials will be provided prior to the study of texts. For further reading, you may refer to Hacettepe, Bilkent and METU libraries as well as online sources.

Method of Instruction:

The course will be conducted through lectures, class discussions and student assignments. The students are expected to contribute to the discussions, as it will **strongly** affect their end-of-term evaluation.

Requirements:

The students are expected to come to class having read the assigned materials. They should always have a copy of the text with them. Attendance is obligatory. More than 11 hours of absence will result in F1. Recording of the lesson is not allowed. **Note:** It is the responsibility of students who have been absent (for any reason) to find out what they have missed as well as to keep a record of their absences. Additionally, violations of academic integrity of any kind will not be tolerated. It can lead to a student's failing the course and being referred to the Dean's Office for disciplinary action. When referring to ideas other than your own, always acknowledge the original source, whether you are quoting or paraphrasing.

Assessment:

Mid-term Examination: 40% Class participation, assignments and quizzes: 10% Final Exam: 50%

In the grading of the exams up to 25% of the total mark will be taken off for the grammatical and writing mistakes. Also, students who get less than 50/100 in the final exam will automatically fail the course no matter how high their midterm results are.
